

MUSIC

Music is taught to our students via the following programme:

The Department boasts a classroom suite of 15 PCs with a range of cloud-based software which can be accessed in school or at home; Sound Trap, Band Lab and Noteflight, as well as 15 61-key semi-weighted midi keyboards. There is also a second classroom housing a class set of keyboards, ukulele's and lead piano. Students can also access four practice rooms all with drum kits, electric guitars, bass guitars and pianos/keyboards.

Peripatetic Lessons

We have a strong and effective team of peripatetic teachers who teach students one-to-one on a variety of modern and classical instruments. Students can work towards Grade-based exams or learn for fun, with both modern and classical repertoire available.

Some of our teachers offer drop-in clubs or free taster lessons to enable students to get a feel for the instrument and assess their interest before commencing lessons.

If your child would like to learn an instrument, contact is made with the relevant teacher directly to organise lessons and direct payment. The Head of Music can provide the relevant contact details on request.

Should your child wish to finish their instrumental lessons, a notice period will need to be served with the teacher, and payment continued until the final notice lesson has taken place.

Home learning

Students in Years 7 and 8 are encouraged to own their own instrument at home which they can then use to support themselves to play music and get better acquainted with music notation. Instruments could include: keyboard, ukulele, recorder, guitar and drums. Students are also required to learn and memorise the notes of the keyboard to support their in-lesson work.

All students taking GCSE, BTEC and A-Level are strongly recommended to have peripatetic lessons on their chosen instrument to support their progress.



At GCSE, BTEC and A level students use home learning to improve their learning in class through regular assignments. GCSE, BTEC and A level booster, revision and theory sessions ensure that all students have access to teacher support at all times. Revision and 1:1 sessions have proven extremely successful in the past in boosting student performance in examinations. These are arranged in collaboration with the students to encourage regular attendance.

Extra-Curricular

There are a range of extra-curricular opportunities available including: Small group instrument clubs e.g. flute and recorder, Choir, Production Band and Guitar Club. Students are encouraged to take part in the Musical aspects of the Production each year in both the Orchestra and Chorus.

Year 7-8

Students cover a range of projects to develop instrumental, composition and performance skills and technique. Regular opportunities for performance are available and students are encouraged to regularly evaluate themselves and others to support progress and improvement.

GCSE

There are 5 Areas of Study:

AoS 1 – MY MUSIC: This is a study of your instrument, its range, technical strengths and limitation; how it is used in different ensembles.

AoS 2 – THE CONCERTO THROUGH TIME: Learners should study the Concerto and its development from 1650 to 1910.

AoS 3 – RHYTHMS OF THE WORLD: This includes the study of Indian Classical and Bhangra, Calypso and Steel Band, African Drumming and Middle Eastern Music.

A Level

The course focuses on 3 Areas of Study:

AoS A – The Western Classical Tradition:

Set Works:

Symphony No. 104 in D Major, 'London' by Haydn

Symphony No.4 in A Major, 'Italian' by Mendelssohn

AoS B - Rock and Pop

AoS E - Into the Twentieth Century

Set Works:

Three Nocturnes, No. 1: Nuages by Debussy

Trio for Oboe, Bassoon and Piano: Movement II by Poulenc

<u>Skills</u>

Candidates are required to develop and demonstrate their musicianship skills through performing, composing, appraising, and:

- to perform for a set amount of time



- to compose either freely or to a set brief
- to demonstrate knowledge and understanding of musical elements, musical contexts and musical language through study of the 3 Areas of Study

<u>COMPOSITION</u> (25% - coursework) You will develop your composing skills in a number of styles, leading up to a submission of TWO pieces (with a combined time of 4-6 minutes in total). One must reflect the musical techniques and conventions associated with the Western Classical Tradition in response to a brief set by the exam board. One is a free composition.

<u>PERFORMANCE</u> (35% - coursework) You will work independently, with support from your instrumental teacher and the Music department, to prepare a recital lasting a minimum of 10 minutes. You will perform at various points throughout the course, though the final examiner assessed performances must take place between March — April of Year 13.

<u>APPRAISING</u> (40% - exam - taken at end of Year 13) Students will sit an examination which will comprise the following styles of questioning:

- 1. Set work analysis with a score
- 2. Extended responses on wider context
- 3. Unprepared extracts of music with and without a score
- 4. Comparison questions

You will sit an exam in the June of Year 13, for 2 hours and 15 minutes.

BTEC Level 3 Extended Certificate in Music Performance

360 Guided Learning Hours - Equivalent in size to one A Level. Designed to support progression to higher education when taken as part of a programme of study that includes other appropriate BTEC Nationals or A Levels. The programme gives a broad overview of the sector, with a focus on performance, including musical skills development and professional practice.

Four units, of which three are mandatory and two are external. Mandatory content (83%). External assessment (58%).
