

RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

The modern world needs young people who are sufficiently confident in their own beliefs and values that they can respect the religious and cultural differences of others, and contribute to a cohesive and compassionate society. RE plays an important part in students' moral and spiritual development and encourages tolerance and respect towards others. The subject is, therefore, part of the basic curriculum which all pupils follow.

RE at Newent Community School and Sixth Form Centre contributes dynamically to students' education by provoking challenging questions about meaning and purpose in life, beliefs about God, ultimate reality, issues of right and wrong, and what it means to be human. In RE they learn about and from religions and worldviews in local, national and global contexts, to discover, explore and consider different answers to these questions. They learn to weigh up the value of wisdom from different sources, to develop and express their insights in response, and to agree or disagree respectfully. Students are equipped with systematic knowledge and understanding of a range of religions and worldviews, enabling them to develop their ideas, values and identities. It develops an aptitude for dialogue so that students can participate positively in our society with its diverse religions and worldviews. Students gain and deploy the skills needed to understand, interpret and evaluate texts, sources of wisdom and authority and other evidence. They learn to articulate clearly and coherently their personal beliefs, ideas, values and experiences while respecting the right of others to differ.

Key Stage 4

All students follow a Core RE course considering Issues of life, death, humanity and the universe. There is a lot of discussion and work is completed in booklets.

In addition, it is also offered as an option following the AQA Spec A syllabus of study. This is broken down into two elements: Study of Religions and Thematic Studies.

Key Stage 5

The RE department also offers a course in Philosophy and Ethics at Key Stage 5. This has proved to be popular in the past, attracting students interested in the challenge to their analytical and thinking skills. The syllabus includes major influences on the study of philosophy and the various ways in which people can arrive at ethical decisions in both religious and non-religious contexts. This is an excellent option for those intending to go on to higher education, as the skills developed can be applied to most other subjects. Universities find evidence of ability to think creatively is a useful way to distinguish applicants in specialist fields such as Science.

Parents have the right to withdraw their children from RE and arrange for alternative, supervised, instruction to support their own beliefs in agreement with the school. Parents wishing to exercise this right should in the first instance contact the Principal in writing.
