
















# Is my child too ill for school?

It can be really tricky deciding whether to keep your child off school when they're unwell. All of us want to do the very best for our children and we understand that missing a day of school results in six lost lessons of learning leading to a negative impact on progress and outcomes. It is important that we give our young people the tools they need to be resilient when they are suffering with their physical or mental health. # **Stagecoach Buses**

We have been told that the B4216 Newent Lane will be closed between Taynton and Newent to allow for works by Gigaclear from 28th September to 18th October 2023. This means that the dedicated service 834 to Newent School will need to divert as follows:-

**Service 834 to Newent School** will divert from the A4136 at Huntley by turning left onto the A40 instead of right. After 3.6 miles it will turn right towards Aston Ingham and Kilcot. When it reaches the B4221 at Kilcot it will turn right. When it reaches Newent, it will turn right into High Street and right into Watery Lane.

**Service 834 to Newnham** will leave Newent via High Street before turning left onto the B4221. At Kilcot it will turn left onto the B4222 towards Aston Ingham. When it reaches the A40 it will turn left. When it reaches Huntley, it will turn right onto the A4136 to rejoin the normal route.
