Local Author

On Tuesday 16th, we were lucky enough to be visited by Cheryl Mayo, a local author whose books appear on Amazon's Kindle Unlimited and whose latest novel reached the top of the chart in its genre in America recently. Cheryl ran a revision session in the library for 20 of our best story writers, preparing them for a question that makes up 50% of their assessment on Paper 1 English Language. She focused on developing a character's deep point of view, editing out unnecessary words and the most effective ways to end. She was also generous enough to share excellent examples of flash fiction that we were able to share with pupils so that they go into their exams with clear professional intent and lift their writing to an even higher standard.





Bletchley Park

On Tuesday, we set off for Bletchley Park with 47 Year 9 and 3 Year 12 History students. The weather was far kinder than last year, although the odd hail storm kept us on our toes! We split into two groups on arrival, with each having a guided tour, a one-hour workshop on the Battle of the Atlantic and the links with code breaking, as well as having time for exploring the original huts, offices and displays. The students were visibly impressed with the scale of challenge that the code breakers faced during the war, and therefore how significant their achievements were at the time. Plenty of food for thought for those considering the further study of Computing and Cyber Security, as well as the role of intelligence and its links with state security. Bletchley Park does involve five hours of travel, but all agreed that the time that is spent there makes it all worthwhile. We look forward to offering this trip again next year to those students who are interested in taking GCSE History and/or Computing. My thanks to the students for their excellent behaviour throughout the day, as well as Mr Santos, Mr Walsh, Mr Worgan and Mr Brown for their help during the day.
