### **Crest Club**

Over the past few weeks, a group of very talented Year 8 Scientists have been attending Crest Club, to work towards their Bronze Award. Their project work has centred around Global Sanitisation, to include microbiology, handwashing and hand drying.

These students have set out to solve the problem of spreading disease and how best to limit the spread of microbes on the hands. A number of different hand washes have been tested to see which inhibited the spread of E. coli.

Furthermore, hand drying methods were explored such as hand towels, hand driers and just 'wafting' your hands in the air! This was to see whether we actually put more microbes onto our hands when drying them!

In addition, surface cleaners were looked at, in terms of which was better at cleaning a worktop.

While the results of their experiments aren't in yet, the next stage is to evaluate our findings and relate them to the real world. However, it is clear to see that these young Scientists have a promising future. It has certainly been a pleasure to work with them!

### **Litter Pick**

Before the students got to work, Natalie gave a talk on the problems and consequences of litter in the environment to Year 7 students and the 22 litter pickers. Some of Year 7 showed they are clearly aware of the impacts by answering the questions posed to them.

Grace Trigg-Hogarth a year 12 leader of Eco-Committee who also joined the litter pick said, 'It's really great to see something happening.' The 7Kg of litter was weighed down by two water bottles and a broken-up thermos but it was still an impressive haul that the student standing on the scales could only just hold onto by himself.





### **Spelling Bee**

Dear parents,

This Wednesday, we held the postponed Spring Spelling Bee term final and what an amazing final it was!

The tutor groups who made it through to the final were C5, C6, C8, M4, M5, M6, N3, N5 and N8. They all stepped into the spelling arena, ready for word-battle. After 17 spellings from the second list of Tier 2 words, C8, M4, M5, N3, N5 and N8 had found themselves lexical causalities of our spelling war, leaving C5, C6 and M6 heavily bedded in their spelling trenches. In a twisted turn of fate, M6 became the overall Spelling Bee winners as C5 and C6 were fatally wounded on the 18<sup>th</sup> spelling. The pressure of lexical mortars began to intensify until on the 58<sup>th</sup> word, and after *much* debate about how 'allegiance' should be spelt, C6 were too badly wounded to continue, securing 3<sup>rd</sup> place.

### Read for Good, Readathon

In addition to the fantastic Spelling Bee news, I would like to draw your attention to a mammoth reading challenge we have now set for our Y7 and Y8 students. Starting Monday 29<sup>th</sup> April, both year groups have been invited to read as often as possible for the following 4 weeks and track the time they spend reading; our aim is to reach a collective target of 40,000 minutes. They do not need to simply read books to help reach the target: comics, newspapers, magazines, recipes, instructions and audio books all aid reading and so all count! If your child is reading at any point, please remind them to note the time spent on the activity and log it in their tracker.

In completing this challenge, we also hope to support a national charity, Read for Good, in raising money specifically for Gloucester Royal Hospital's children and education department. During this week and next, Y7 and Y8 students will be given Read for Good 'Track My Read' logins, bookmarks and sponsorship forms. It would be wonderful, if possible, for as many of our students to raise as little, or as much, sponsorship as they are able to, to help benefit Gloucestershire's children when in hospital.

Please find <u>attached</u> a letter which explains the 'Readathon' and <u>details</u> on how you could help promote and support your child at home to read as widely and as much as possible.


