

Message from our Principal

Dear Newent School Community,

With the weather being wetter again, we have had to monitor the use of the field at break times and so thank you to the student body who have worked with us to clear the field promptly at the end of break, when it has been open, and relocating back to the hard courts when it has been too wet. It looks like things will improve next week so can I take this opportunity to remind you that Blazers are a compulsory item of uniform, and jumpers are for underneath as an optional extra, on the colder days. We also received our draft OFSTED report which I cannot share but will as soon as I am able. It was the second short inspection since 2014 and as I said immediately after the visit, the key outcome of this inspection is that the school maintains its 'good' rating. The inspector has written the report as I shared at the time, highlighting areas of excellent practice, alongside some clear feedback to help us progress. We continue to move our key stage three curriculum and teaching forward as the exam season starts, with the same 'recall, reflect and relaunch' approach which has underpinned our review of key stages 4 and 5. Paul A. Kirschner, a professor in Educational Psychology, is quoted as saying 'Before you start something new, review the old'. Many areas have a good blend of knowledge and skills in the key stage 3 curriculum, but we will be looking at the balance and ensuring we are building knowledge and planning more retrieval exercises in lessons to mirror key stage 4.

The main exam season starts next week – I can't believe we have got there already.

- Correct school uniform must be worn at all times during examinations.
- Students are responsible for ensuring they bring the correct equipment to their examinations and any pencil cases must be transparent.
- Water is permitted to be taken into examination rooms but must be in a clear bottle with no labels/writing.
- Mobile phones or other electronic devices (including watches) must be turned off and handed into Invigilators before the start of examinations.
- It must be made very clear that students who breach examination conditions will automatically be withdrawn from all examinations.


Stagecoach Services 830 & 834
