FOUR HISTORY TRIPS IN FOURTEEN DAYS

We have been busy exploring our local, and not so local area, over the last two weeks.

Year 9 & 12 trip to Bletchley Park - Tuesday 29th April (Mr Santos)

Despite a slightly earlier start, 44 Year 9 students, five Year 12 students and five staff, all made the long journey to Milton Keynes to find out more about the World War Two code-breaking operations at Bletchley Park.

Bletchley Park is an English country house and estate that became the principal centre of Allied codebreaking during the Second World War. During the war, the estate housed the Government Code and Cypher School (GC&CS), which regularly penetrated the secret communications of the Axis Powers (Germany, Italy and Japan) – most importantly the German Enigma and Lorenz ciphers. The team at Bletchley Park devised automatic machinery to help with decryption, culminating in the development of Colossus, the world's first programmable digital electronic computer. Codebreaking operations at Bletchley Park came to an end in 1946 and all information about the wartime operations was classified until the mid-1970s. Today, and throughout the "Cold War" such intelligence gathering operations are carried out at the Government Communications Headquarters (GCHQ) in Cheltenham.

We arrived at exactly the right time to be dropped off and the party was then split into two groups, which then attended all of the same events at different points in the day. There was a guided tour of the estate, which was very useful as an overview. There was a one-hour workshop on code-breaking and its connections with the Battle of the Atlantic, as well as time to visit the many former "huts" where the code breakers worked and other exhibition rooms. Time spent in the museum's shop was also particularly welcome! The Learning Team at Bletchley Park managed the whole process for us, and despite there being eight other schools there on the day, our paths rarely crossed - a very slick operation indeed.

Overall, this is was an excellent experience and the students are to be commended for their attention,



engagement and good behaviour throughout the day. Many thanks to the staff involved - Ms Dufour for stepping in at the last minute, Mrs Evans, Mrs Smith and Miss Prior-Smith.



Year 7 trips to Goodrich Castle -Thursday 1st May (Mr Woodward) & Friday 2nd May (Mr Yorath-Walsh)

Ninety of our Year 7 students visited this English Heritage site over the course of these two days. The students learned about the next stage of castle development, as the Normans quickly replaced their original motte and bailey castles with far sturdier stone-built versions from the 1100s onwards. Goodrich Castle is the perfect example of "what came next". The students were given a two-hour tour of the main parts of the castle, and time was made for a visit to the gift shop. All students behaved well and represented the school in the best possible light. Our thanks also go to Mr Hussain, Mrs Smith, Mr Careless and Miss Prior-Smith for their support on one of the days.





Year 7 trip to Harvington Hall - Monday 12th May

In our tenth trip of the year, 38 Year 7 students, visited Harvington Hall near Kidderminster, which is an old moated residence dating back to the later Middle Ages. The house was fully occupied during Tudor times but was then left uninhabited from the early 1600s until it was bought in the 1920s; therefore it still retains the majority of its Tudor features. During the reign of Elizabeth I, Catholic priests were not allowed to perform services within the community and so these were carried out in secret. Various ingenious ways were used to hide such priests from arrest and the students were much impressed with these. Before lunch, the three groups did a carousel of workshops on Tudor "mystery objects", priest hides and the Tudor kitchen, all of which were much enjoyed. After lunch there was a guided tour of the house, which is particularly famous for it's priest hides. I was very pleased with the behaviour of the group and give my thanks to the students for their excellent attitude and behaviour throughout the day; and also to Mr Yorath-Walsh, Mrs Smith and Miss Prior-Smith for their help during the day.





Library News - Book Buzz Titles Announced


It is a way off until September, but we like to be organised here in the school library and have preordered the 16 Book Buzz titles and here they are!
