# Attendance Matters - 2025/26 Term Times

At Newent Community School, we are incredibly grateful to our parents and carers who continue to support our students by avoiding holidays during term time. Your commitment to your child's education is deeply appreciated and makes a real difference.

### **Why Attendance Matters**

Every day in school counts. According to the Department for Education, pupils with no absence are 1.5 times more likely to achieve five or more GCSEs at grades 4–9 (including English and Maths) than those who miss 10–15% of school. Even short absences can disrupt learning, reduce confidence, and impact long-term outcomes. Remember, every day lost accounts for six missed lessons that cannot be replaced.

# **Living Our HEART Values: Accountability**

By planning holidays outside of term time, you are demonstrating one of our core HEART values: Accountability. This means taking responsibility for your child's learning and understanding the vital role that attendance plays in their success. It also means working in partnership with the school to ensure every student has the best chance to thrive.



# **Biology & Geography Field Trip**

The Yr 12 Biology and Geography fieldtrip to Aberystwyth University took place this week from Monday to Wednesday. The Biologists focused on exploring zonation along the shoreline, examining how species composition and structure vary with tidal conditions. They studied how different organisms are adapted to survive at low and high tide, contributing valuable data for their core practical write-up, due before the end of term. This work will also be directly assessed in the A level Biology examination.

Meanwhile, the Geographers were investigating how to carry out a piece of physical and human field-work: for the physical piece, we evaluated the effectiveness of current coastal management schemes and for the second, explored the impact of tourism on the town. These studies offered real-world insights to help shape their own independent fieldwork projects over the summer—worth 20% of their final A level grade.

Both groups joined together on the last day to study ecological succession in sand dunes, analysing how plant species and landforms evolve over time.

There was also a little free time for enjoying the University facilities and getting an insight into life on campus. The students represented our school values exceptionally well and were suitably sleepy on the minibus home after all the hard work, sunshine and ice creams!





# **Anti Racism Week**

This week, Newent Community School held its inaugural Anti-Racism Week, a dedicated initiative aimed at raising awareness, promoting critical reflection, and fostering a culture of inclusion and equality within our school community.

Throughout the week, pupils participated in PSHE education sessions focused on developing an understanding of unconscious bias, exploring the harmful impact of racist and dehumanising language, and learning constructive strategies to identify and challenge racism in all its forms. Each department made a meaningful contribution by incorporating into their curriculum the work and achievements of individuals from ethnic minority backgrounds who have made significant contributions to their respective subject areas.

The Art Department curated impactful displays, and a considerable amount of pupils' work demonstrated a mature and thoughtful engagement with the themes explored. In tutor time, pupils were provided with safe and supportive opportunities to discuss the issues raised, ask questions, and reflect on the role each of us plays in building an inclusive school environment.

As a symbol of our collective commitment, all members of the school community have signed an Anti-Racism Pledge, affirming that Newent Community School does not tolerate prejudice, discrimination, or dehumanising language in any form.

While this marks an important milestone, it is only the beginning. We remain resolute in our aim to become an actively anti-racist institution, and we will continue to embed this commitment into the fabric of school life moving forward.






# **Drama London Trip 2025**

# **History Trip - SS Great Britain**

On Monday, 50 Year students travelled south to Bristol to visit an iconic ship, the SS Great Britain. The SS Great Britain was a ground-breaking British ship, renowned as the world's first screw-propelled, ocean-going, iron-hulled vessel. Designed by Isambard Kingdom Brunel, it launched in 1843 and played a significant role in maritime history, serving as a transatlantic liner, an emigrant clipper, a troop ship, and even a cargo vessel before becoming a coal storage ship in the Falkland Islands. Eventually, it was salvaged and returned to Bristol, where it now serves as a museum ship. On arrival we were split into two groups, each of which did a tour of the ship and a workshop on some of the passengers who travelled on the ship at various points in its history, and for various reasons. After lunch we had ample time to visit the shop, which was much enjoyed by all. This was the first time that we have ran this trip and I will definitely be looking to do so again for our current Year 7s. All of the students behaved well and I thank those other staff involved for their support - Mr Hussain, Mrs Smith and Mr Brabham.
